District improvement funds

Learn how the supervisors spent your district's dollars

program is that because we do not have to pay for those things ourselves, the money we bring in we can give right back to local charities like the YMCA, the YWCA, Richmond Friends of the Homeless and the Chesterfield Christmas Mother."

Under the district improvement program, each county supervisor is allocated \$48,500 per year for his or her district, and what doesn't get spent carries over into the next year. However, there's discussion about reducing the annual allocation because of the amount left over each year, according to Midlothian Supervisor Dan Gecker and Allan Carmody, the county's budget and management director. It's also possible that previously unallocated funds could go to the general fund instead of carrying over year to year.

Out of a pool of \$535,482 in available district improvement funds, county supervisors spent just \$90,573 last fiscal year, leaving nearly \$445,000 to carry over into FY10. The amount spent last year went largely to adding streetlights in county neighborhoods and funding events such as after-prom parties for high school students and community fairs.

If you're a county taxpayer who attends the 28th Annual Midlothian Village Day Festival and Craft Fair on Oct. 17, you can thank yourself for helping to put on the event.

Run by the Midlothian Junior Women's Club, the popular fall festival at Midlothian Middle School will be underwritten by a \$4,525 grant from the county's district improvement program, which funds community projects and events like the festival. The county money will pay for everything from the stage for the festival's entertainers to the moon bounce for the kiddies, not to mention the dumpsters, the rented tables and chairs for the food vendors and the off-duty police officers to work security.

"We could not run the festival without it," Mary Eovino, the event chairperson, says of the county district improvement program. "It's a great thing. And what is so great about this

"I can't think of anybody who has called me in the last year looking for district improvement funds," says Gecker. But he believes that's not because groups in the county aren't aware of the funds - he just thinks groups tend to contact the county administration rather than their supervisors.

The district improvement program funds community projects in five categories: eligible public events such as community festivals and parades; funding for public school and university programs; public improvements to public land; the purchase of property or equipment for the county government; and contributions to organizations to which the county may legally make donations.

Groups interested in applying for district improvement funds fill out a brief application. Generally, once an application is reviewed and approved by county staff, it is forwarded to the board of supervisors. Board members usually approve district fund expenditures as part of the consent agenda during their business meetings. (Unlike district funds in other localities, the funds are not discretionary; any expenditures require majority approval from the board.)

At least one recipient thinks the county should do a better job of letting community groups know that the money is out there, though. And she also says that the county should spend district improvement funds as intended, rather than keeping the funds in the bank or rolling them into the general fund.

"It's really important that people know the money is out there [and available]. I know [county] money has to be allocated for lots of other things, but to give people a sense of community is very important," says Angie McDaniel, chairperson of the annual Chester Kiwanis Christmas Parade, which is always held on the second Sunday of December and usually draws around 5,000 people. About 70 community groups, from local scout troops and school marching bands to local businesses, big and small, usually participate in the parade.

Last year, due to budget cutbacks at the Virginia Department of Transportation and the Chesterfield Police Department, the Chester Kiwanis were faced with having to pay a bill of around \$5,000 for road closures and traffic safety, and that would probably have meant the end of the parade, McDaniel says. But after making a successful application to the district improvement fund with the help of county Supervisor Dorothy Jaeckle, the parade went on as planned with full funding.

"This is one of the few free events that the Chester community can still count on, but we wouldn't be able to do it if the county didn't help out," McDaniel says. "Without that money, it would put a real end to what we're doing. The Kiwanis, we raise funds to provide scholarships, and to put something on like this parade for the community, we would have to take money out of the money we raised [for scholarships]."

In addition to public events like the Chester Christmas parade or Midlothian Village Day, the district improvement program has also funded necessary countywide infrastructure improvements. For instance, in Gecker's district, the Ramsgate neighborhood received \$2,420 to correct a problem with excess algae in a pond. ("They say the pond is clear now," Gecker reports happily.) And collectively, the five supervisors approved more than \$36,000 for adding strategically placed streetlights in neighborhoods that applied countywide.

The River's Bend neighborhood in the Bermuda District was one of those that received streetlights. "We had some elderly folks who were quite concerned about the fact that it was so dark over there, and we have some issues periodically where people are breaking into cars out in the driveways," says Nancy Huntington, who applied for the lights when she was community property manager for River's Bend. "The people over there are thrilled to have the lights."

Huntington was surprised to hear the supervisors had much more money to spend on district improvements than they used. If she had known that, she said, she would have also applied for additional streetlights that are still needed in her neighborhood. She had assumed after talking to county employees about the tight budget that the funds weren't there, so she hadn't tried to get everything her neighborhood needed. After all, one of the streetlights in her community cost more than \$1,750 to install because of needing to run new underground electrical lines to

a distant power supply.

"Trust me," she says. "I'm going to be calling down to the county environmental department and asking them to start the project back up."
