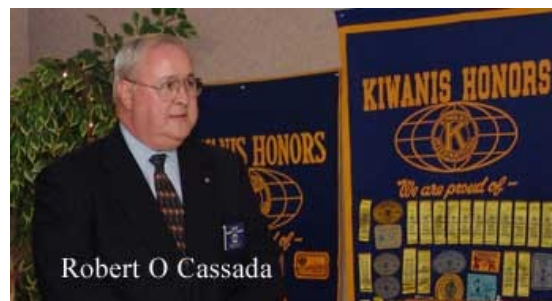

Q: Why was Santa's little helper depressed?

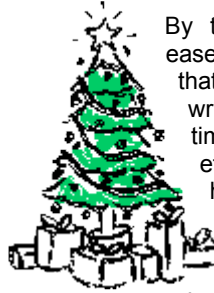
A: Because he had low elf esteem.

Fact or Fiction: The tradition of celebrating Christmas in the US was brought over from England by the Puritans.

Fiction. In Colonial America, the Puritans of New England disapproved of Christmas. Celebration was outlawed in Boston from 1659 to 1681. At the same time, Christian residents of Virginia and New York observed the holiday freely. Christmas fell out of favor in the United States after the American Revolution, when it was considered an English custom.



By the 1820s, sectarian tension had eased and British writers began to worry that Christmas was dying out. These writers imagined Tudor Christmas as a time of heartfelt celebration, and efforts were made to revive the holiday. Charles Dickens's book *A Christmas Carol*, published in 1843, played a major role in reinventing Christmas as a holiday emphasizing family, goodwill, and compassion as opposed to communal celebration and hedonistic excess.

In America, interest in Christmas was revived in the 1820s by several short stories by Washington Irving which appear in his *The Sketch Book of Geoffrey Crayon* and "Old Christmas", and by Clement Clarke Moore's 1822 poem *A Visit From St. Nicholas* (popularly known by its first line: *'Twas the Night Before Christmas*).

Potage Stamp Saved this Month:

October 23, 2008, in New York, New York, the Postal Service™ issued a 42-cent, Christmas: Virgin and Child with the Young John the Baptist by Sandro Botticelli special stamp, designed by Richard Sheaff of Scottsdale, Arizona.

The 2008 Christmas stamp features a detail from a work by the Italian master Sandro Botticelli, entitled *Virgin and Child with the Young John the Baptist*. This

painting, tempera and oil on wood, dates to around 1490 and is now in the collection of the Cleveland Museum of Art. It presents one of the most common figural groups in religious art.
